



On August 6, 1992, the heavily decomposed body of a female was found in the desert area south of US 60 and west of Idaho Road in Apache Junction, Arizona. The victim, Jane Doe, was approximately 16-18 years of age, 4'11" to 5'1", had coarse brown hair and is believed to be of mixed race with Hispanic traits. The victim is believed to have been at this location for three to five weeks.

The victim was wearing a "Team Gear" brand, size large, t-shirt with soccer balls imprinted on the front and back. She was also wearing a pair of Levis denim cutoff shorts. A ring was located on her left ring finger.

The victim's teeth are the most prominent feature as she apparently has had no dental care and the teeth protrude from the mouth. Terry Wesbrock, a forensic artist since 1984, offered to reconstruct the victim's face. In 2012, the FBI did a facial approximation for Jane Doe as well. Shown are the photographs of the reconstructed face of Jane Doe and reproductions of the clothing she was wearing when she was found.

An autopsy failed to determine a cause of death. Dental x-rays, dental charts and fingerprints for Jane Doe were obtained. A DNA profile for Jane Doe is in the CODIS national database.
